What Are Advanced Placement® Courses?











Advanced Placement *: The Basics

- 10 and 20-level courses are designed to prepare students for the 30-level course and AP exam
- 30-level AP® courses are university-level courses offered in high school
- Courses reflect what is taught in top introductory university courses
- Students take **AP Exams** at the end of the 30-level course, measuring their mastery of university-level work
- A score of 3 out of 5 or higher on an AP exam can typically earn students university credit and/or placement into advanced courses in university




AP®: The Benefits











- Students learn rigorous university-level content and skills
- Taking AP is valued in the university admission process
- AP courses are interesting and rewarding academic experiences



Opportunity to earn valuable credit and placement in university











AP®: Skills & Advantages

- AP courses tell university admission officials that students are challenging themselves and preparing for the rigors they'll encounter in their university careers
 - Taking an AP course helps students build critical thinking skills, confidence, and the essential time management and study skills needed for university success
- Nationally, research shows that students who score a 3 or higher on an AP Exam typically earn higher grade point averages in university and have higher graduation rates than their non-AP peers*

The National Research Project: Preliminary Results

Participation

- University of Alberta: 5,375 students overall (1,447 AP)
- University of British Columbia: 7,289 students overall (1,787 AP)

Results

- Most popular: Calculus, English Literature and Chemistry
- Even with only one AP exam, students outperform by their non-AP students by over 11% (by over 20% if they have 3 or more exams)
- Retention into 2nd year goes up 10% (UBC)



New Findings on the AP Experience













No matter the score, completing an AP Exam has benefits.

- More than 75% of admission officers the College Board surveyed said that a low score on an AP Exam would not harm an applicant's admission prospects.
- Universities consider many more factors than just exam scores, including strength of coursework and final grades in rigorous courses.
- By enrolling in AP courses, students demonstrate that they are interested in challenging themselves and learning at a college level.









AP® Helps Students Graduate on Time & Save Money

Students who take AP courses and exams are much more likely to complete a university degree on time.* Graduating in four years represents a significant savings on the cost of university.

- Only 1 in 4 university students completes a bachelor's degree in 4 years.
- The average cost of university tuition for a single year is \$6,580** at Canadian universities. Other expenses may include books, software, living expenses, etc.

AP® Expands Students' Options

When students earn university credits through AP [®] Exams, their options and opportunities expand:

- Move to upper-level university courses sooner
- Pursue a double major









AP®: A More Engaging Learning Experience

AP® courses challenge students to work and participate at a higher level:

- Opportunities to explore topics in depth
- High expectations for critical thinking, analysis, synthesis, evidence, multiple perspectives, and clear written and verbal communications











AP[®] Exams











AP® Exams

AP [®] Exams are administered by schools worldwide on set dates in May each year. The exams occur at the end of the 30-level AP course.

- Exams are typically 3 hours and include:
 - Multiple-choice questions
 - Free-response items such as essays, problem solving, and document-based questions










Credit and Placement Opportunities

What is it like to take AP® Courses?





AP® Myths & Realities









Myth	Reality
AP courses are for students who always get good grades.	AP courses are for any students who are academically prepared and have a passion for the subject area. If you're willing to work and if you're prepared academically, you should be able to succeed in an AP course.
AP courses are too stressful.	AP courses consist of more in-depth work not extra questions or more work. Students feel challenged and engaged and are no longer bored with focusing on basic concepts and review.
I don't think I will score high enough on the AP Exam to get university credit.	You don't need to score a 5. Many universities grant credit — and placement as well — based on a 3 or higher on an AP Exam.
Taking AP courses could hurt my overall average.	Students are assessed according to the Alberta curriculum i.e. assessed at the same level as all grade 10 students.
I can't take AP because no one has recommended me.	If you think you're ready to take an AP course, then you're ready to advocate for yourself — just talk to a teacher or counselor.
